



WHAT TO EXPECT



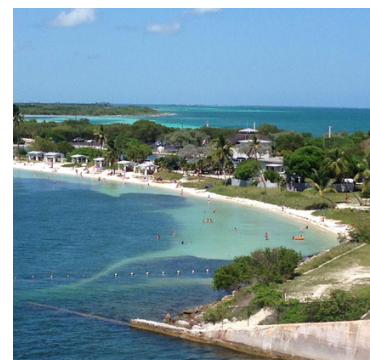
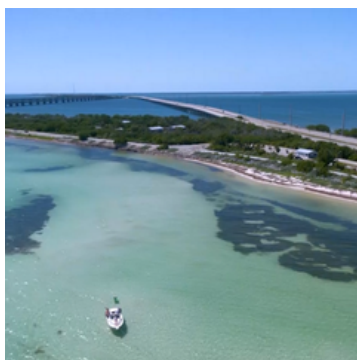

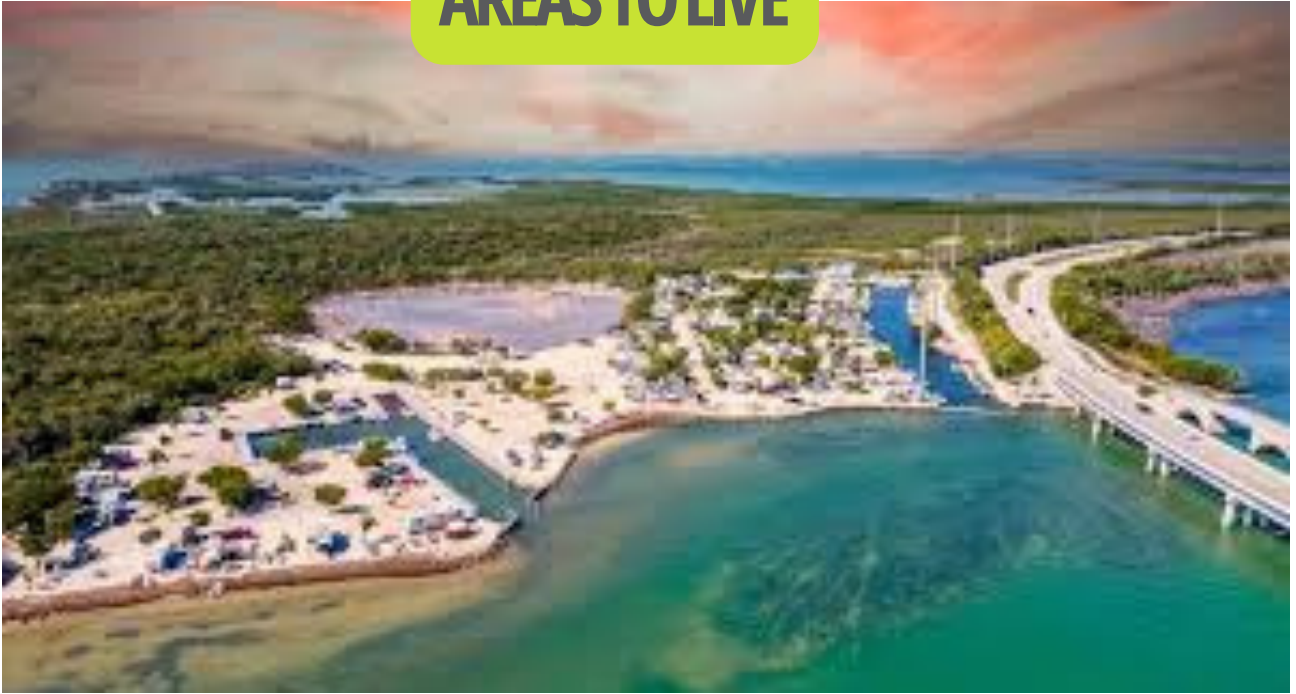
